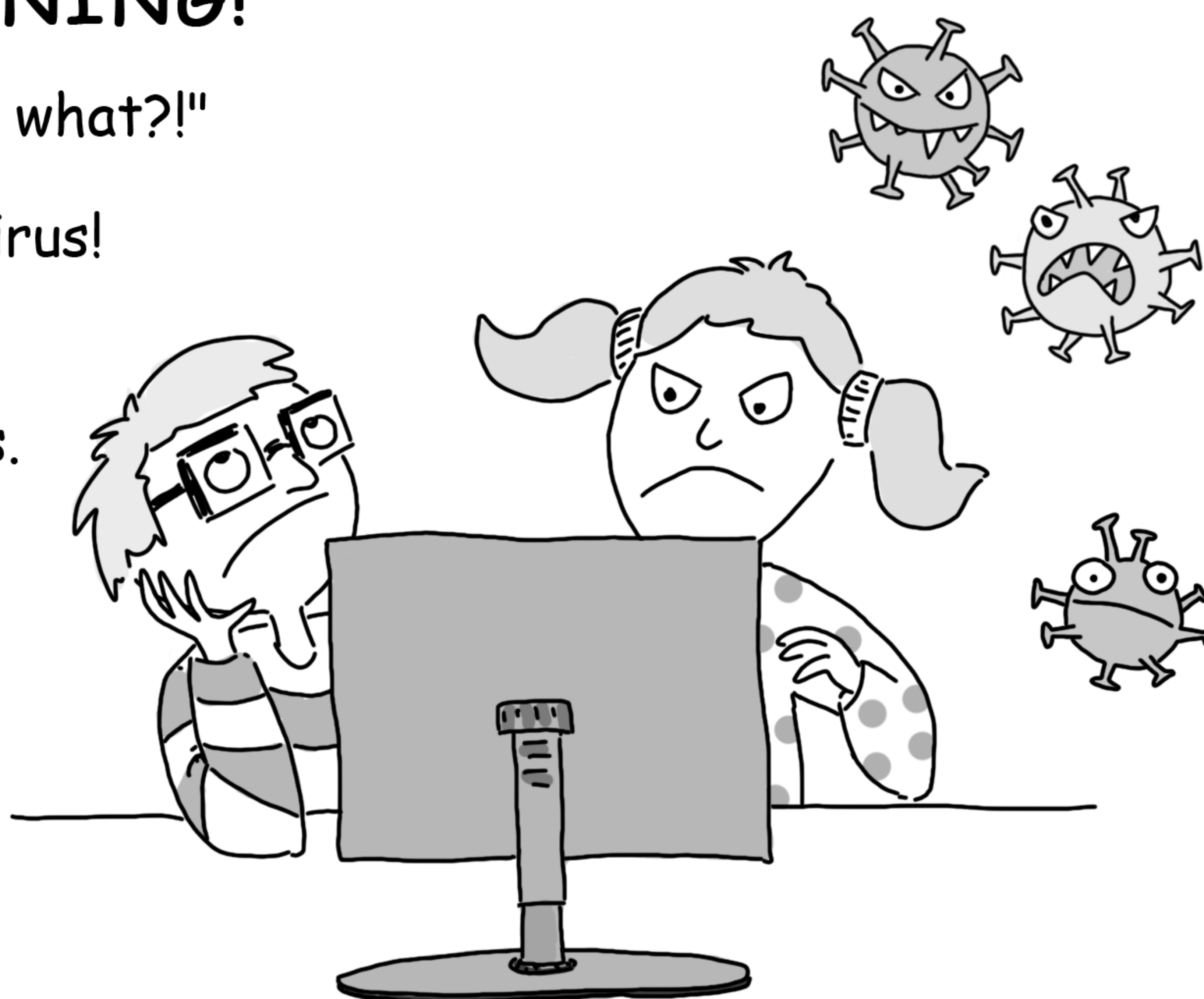
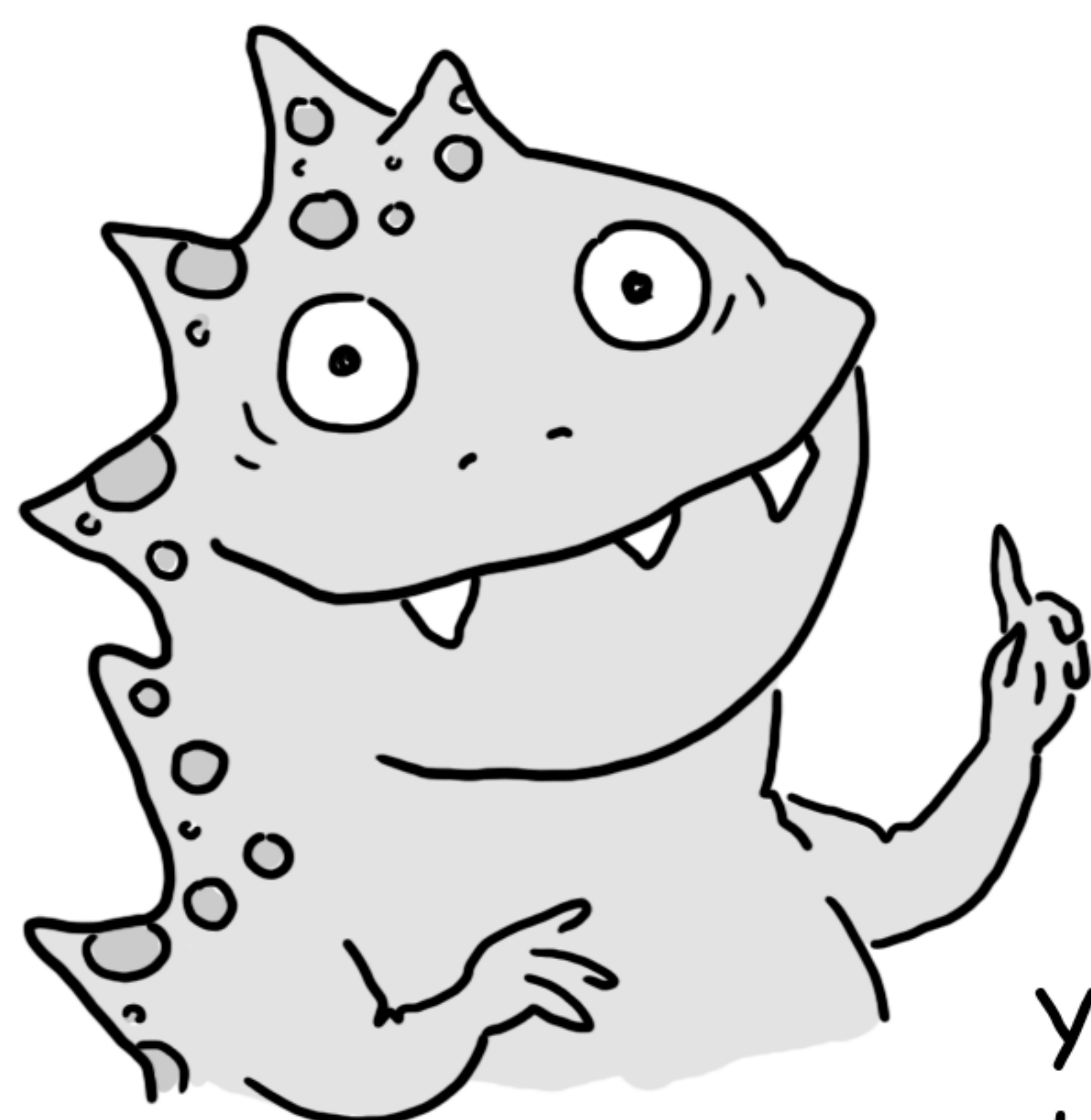


VIRUS WARNING!

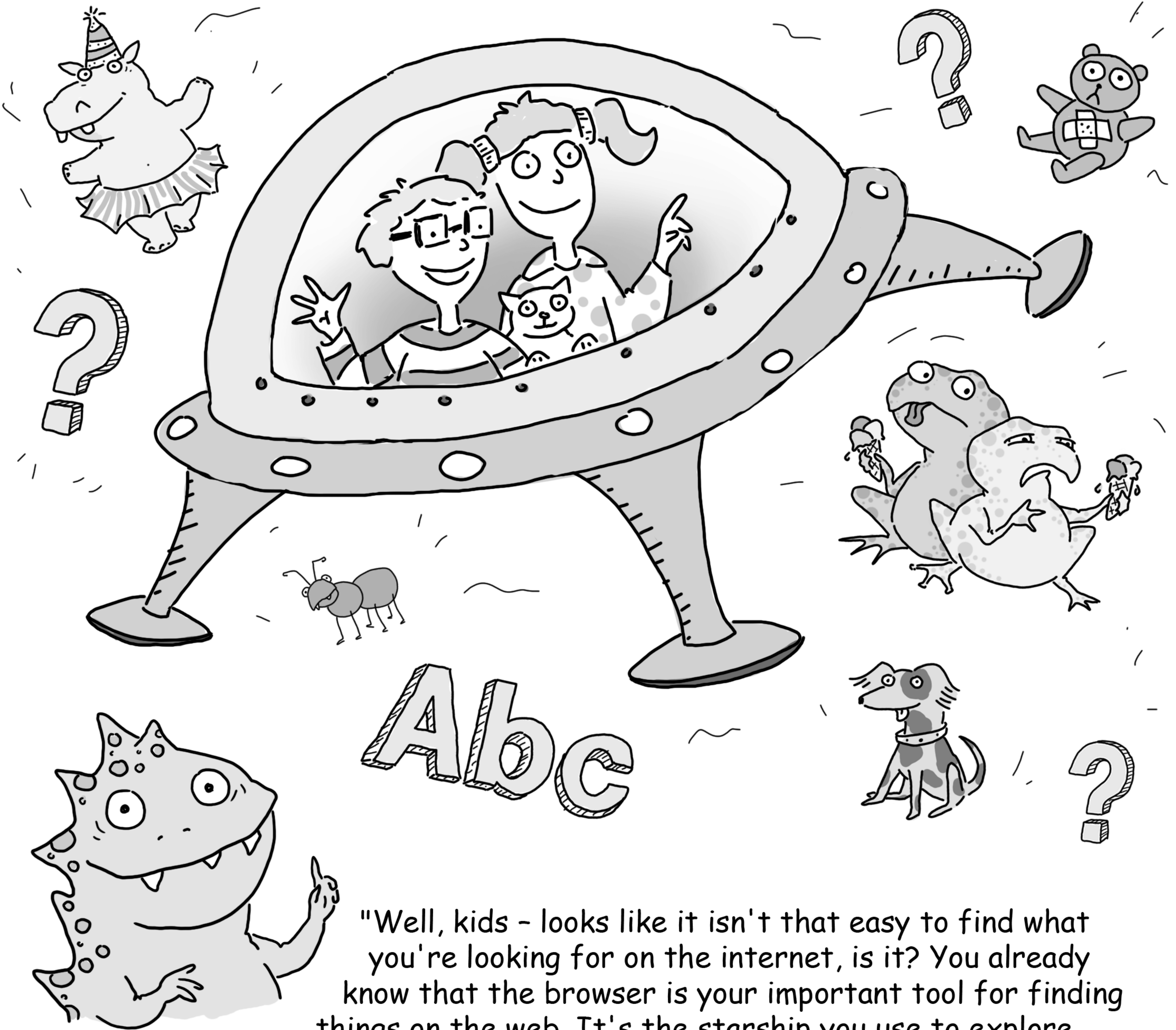
These nasty viruses hide in email attachments, like photos and videos. Or you could download them from the internet - without noticing anything - when you click a link...

Researching: Seek and find on the Internet

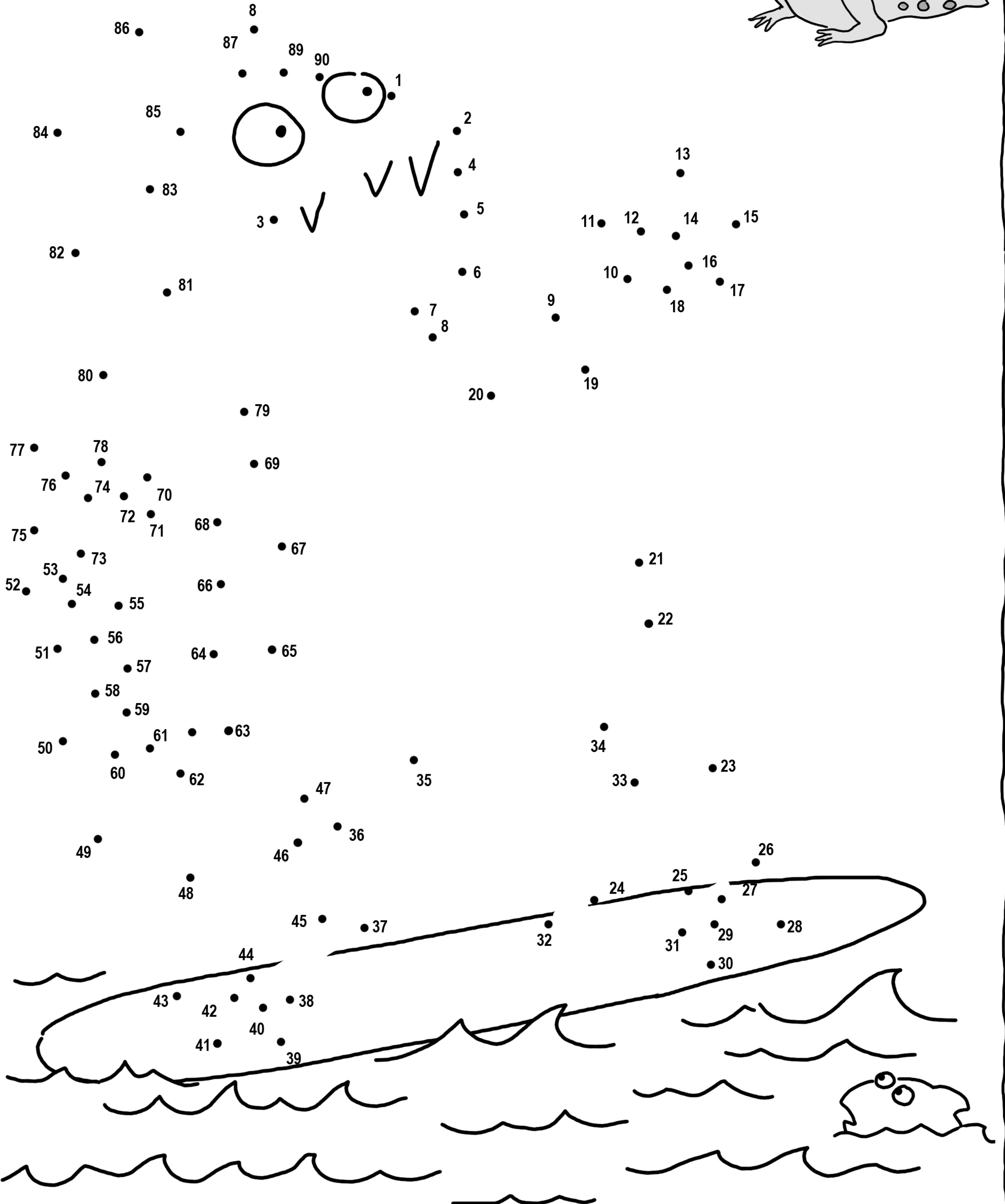

Something's missing here! Connect the dots - and find out who the beautiful teeth belong to!



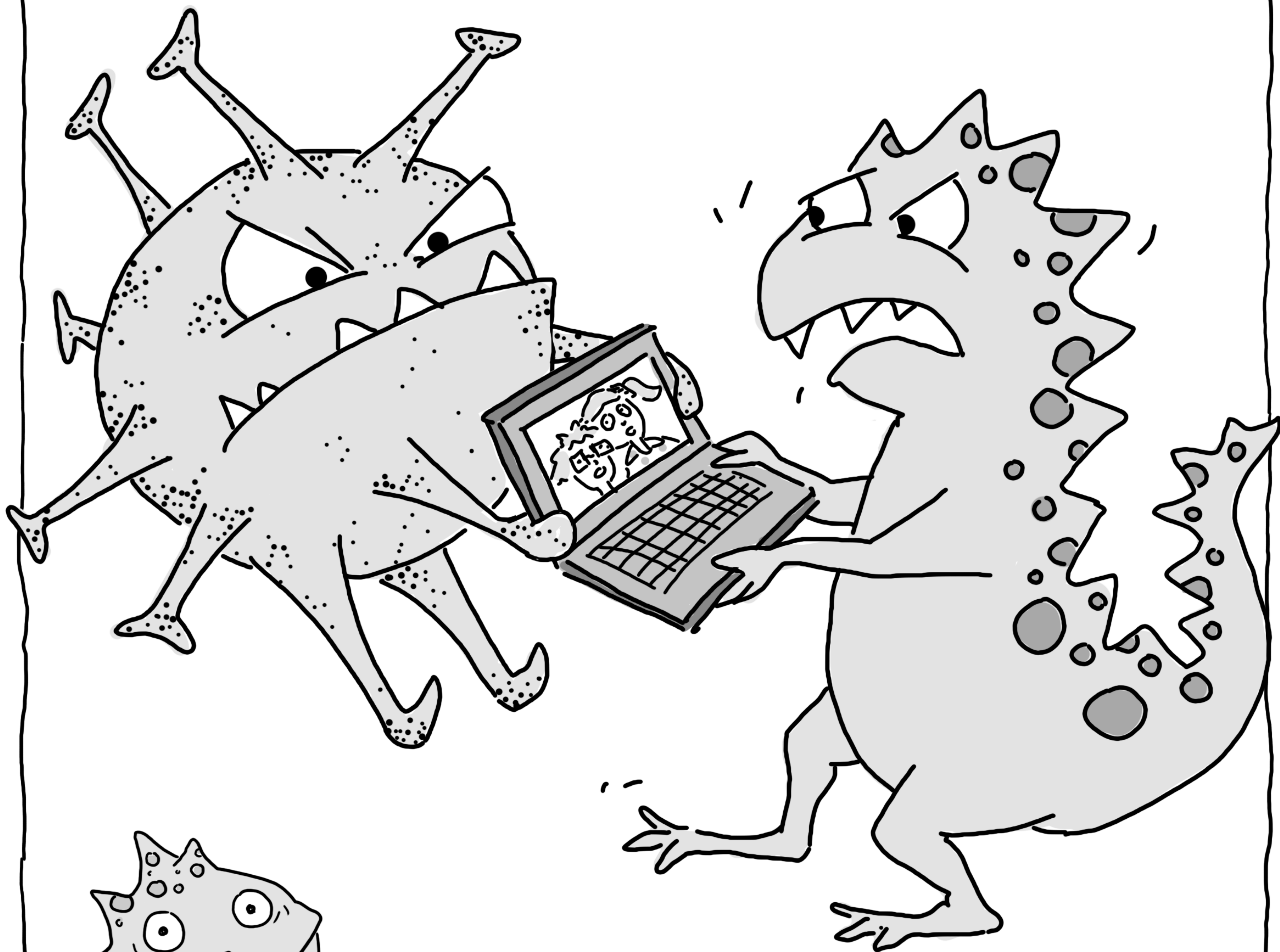

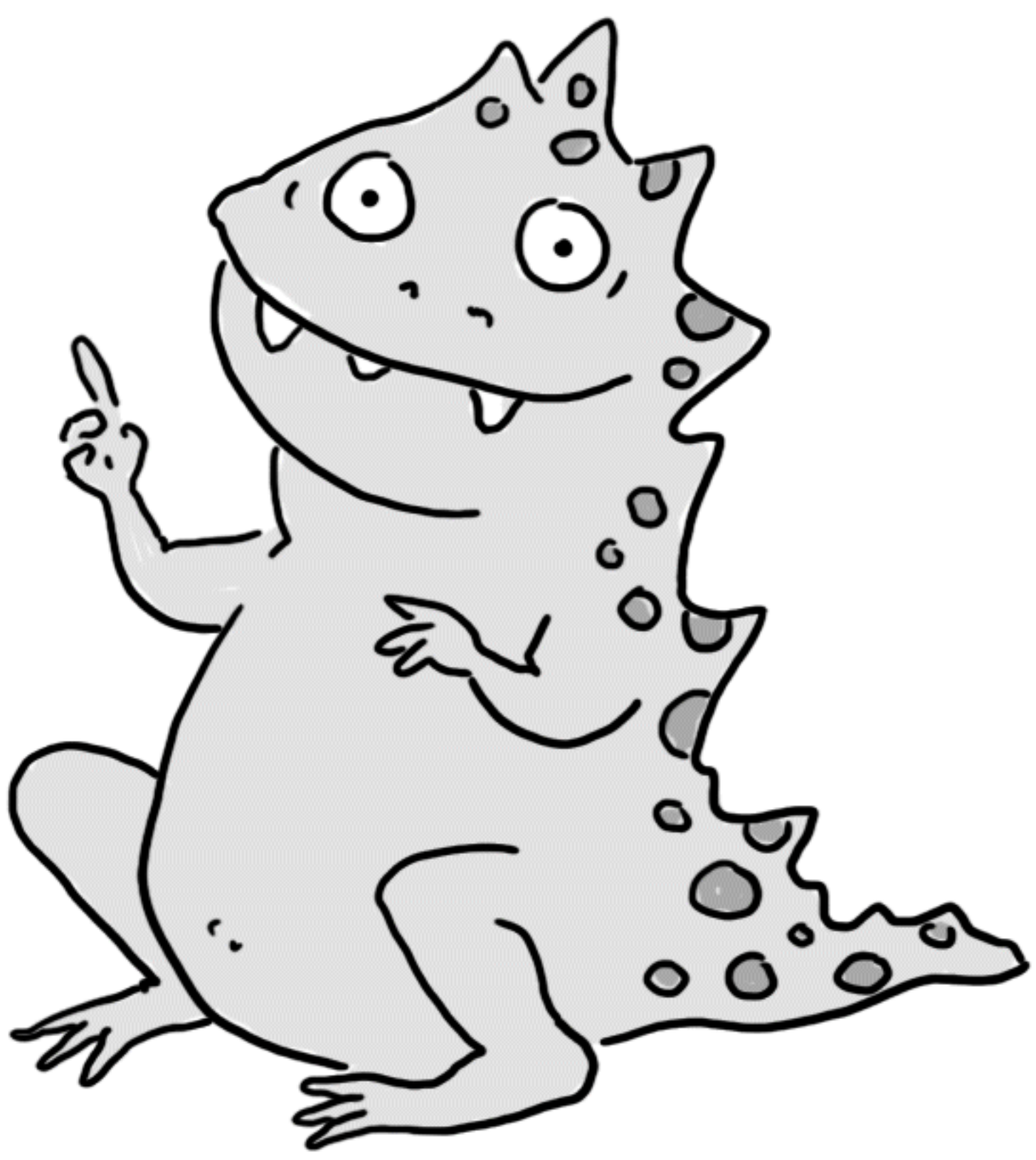

First of all: Never open attachments in emails from strangers.

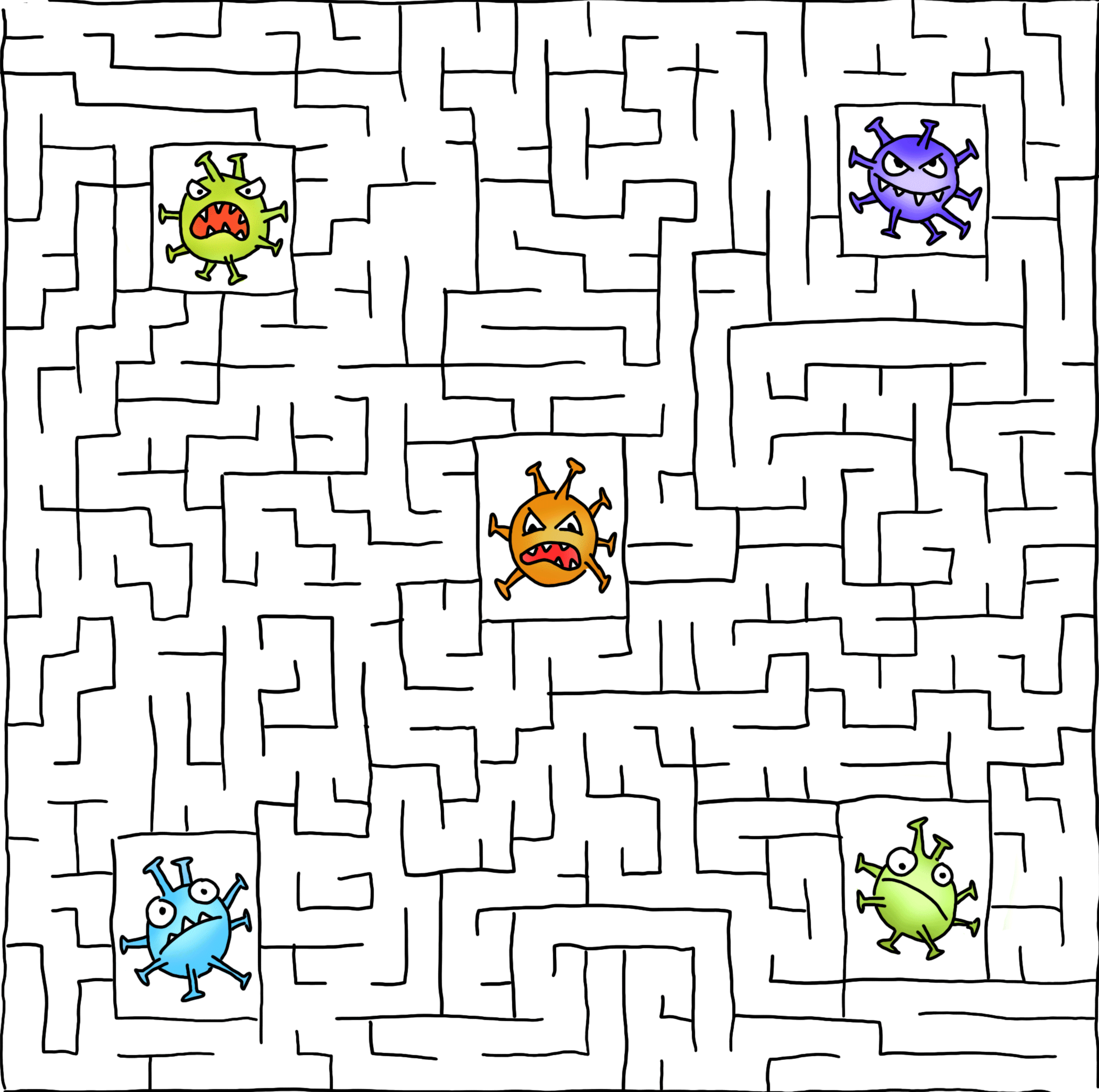
Secondly: Never click links in emails from strangers.

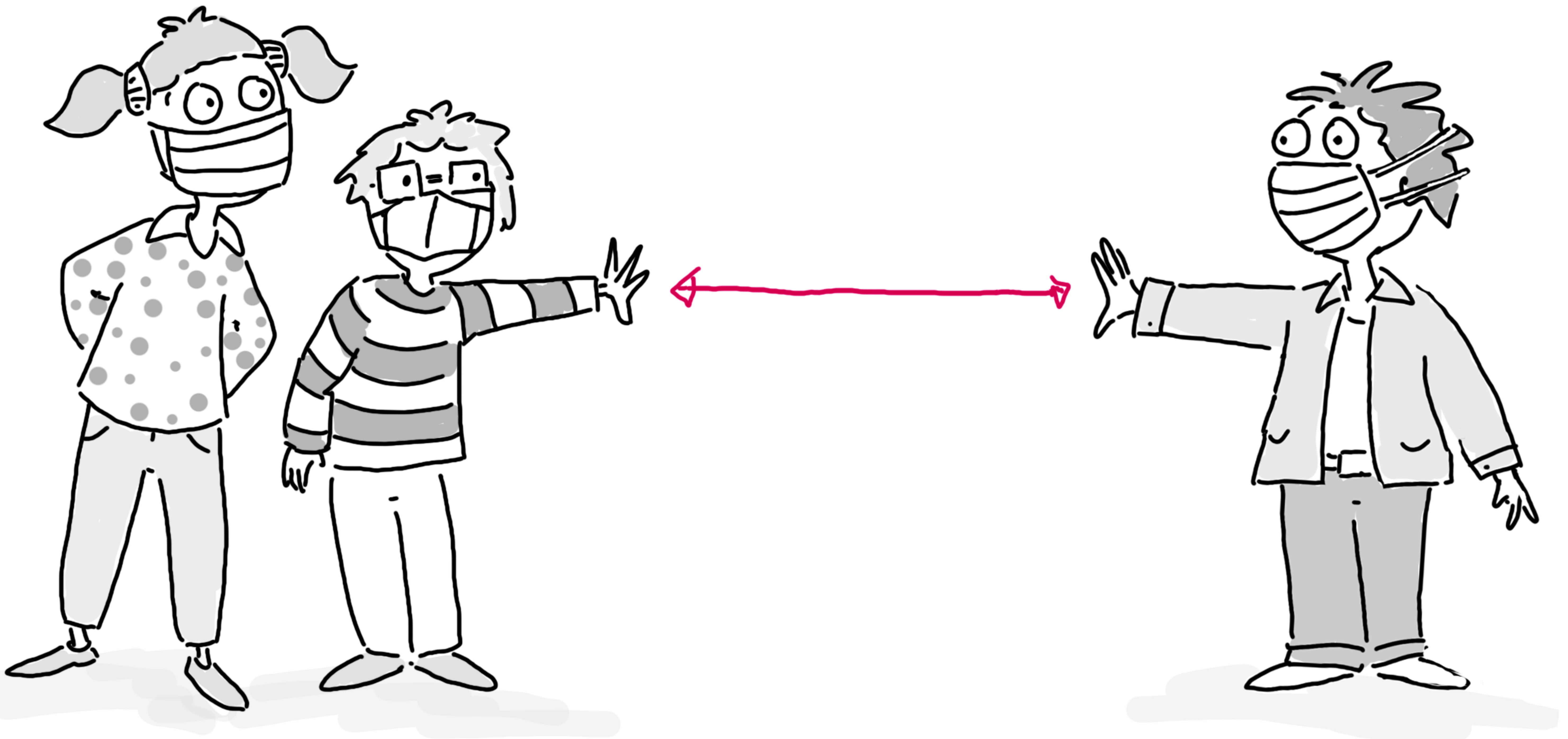
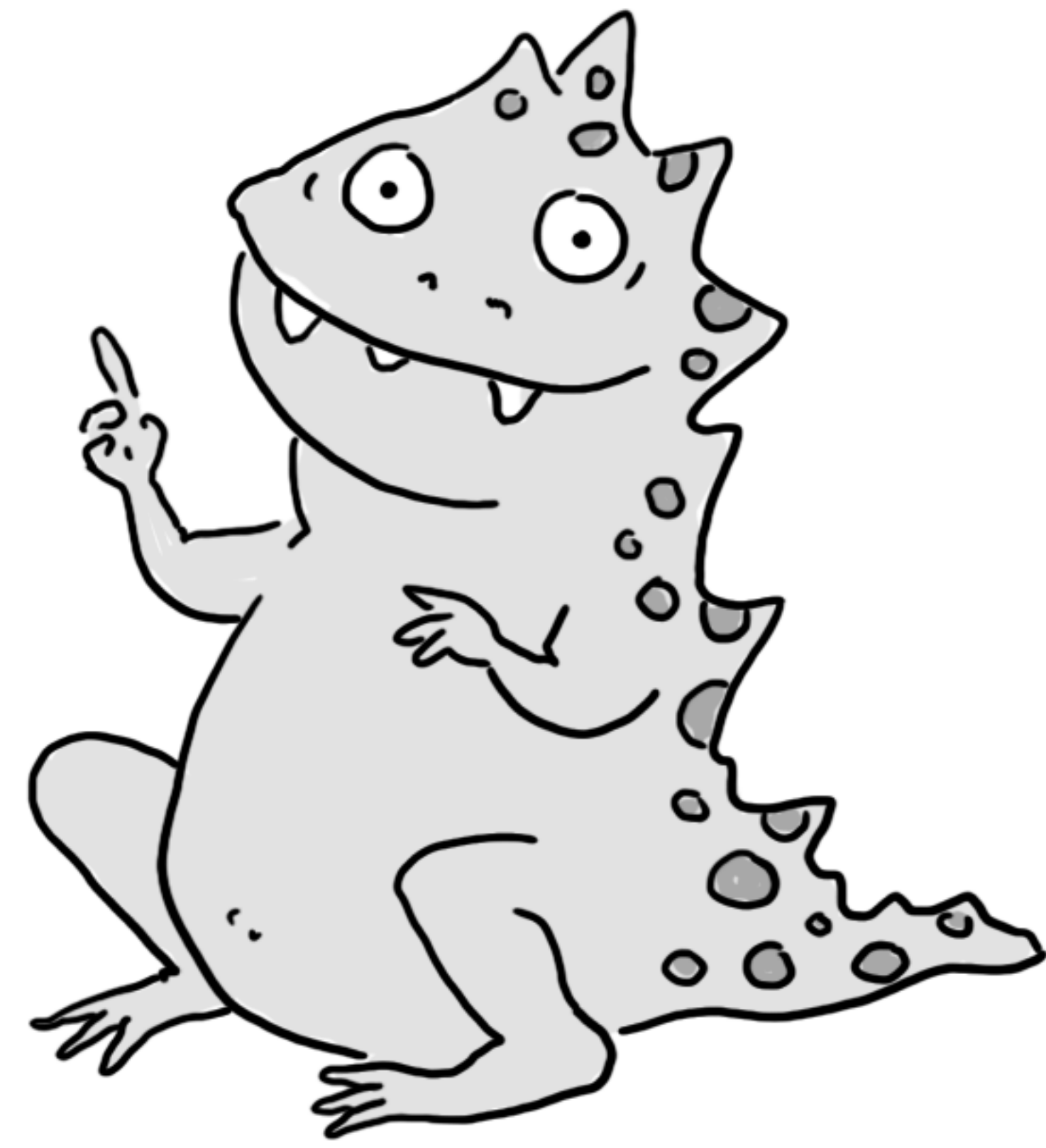
"And now we have a real internet mystery for you to solve! Ask your mom or dad to join you. I think they'll be interested, too! Imagine this: After you get up every morning, you check your emails. And surprise! You've won something! You just have to click the link in the email to find out how to get your prize..."

Well?! Do you smell a rat? What would real internet detectives do if they got this email? Let's see who figures it out first..."

We're finally going back to school! But as you know, everyone has to wear a mask. Let's make some ourselves, so we'll always have clean ones with us!

You can make a mask quickly and easily, even if you can't sew!

All you need: an old T-shirt that you don't wear anymore and (optional) a piece of wire

Step 1: Cut out a rectangle along the lower edge of the T-shirt. The rectangle should be 15 cm high and 35 cm wide.

Step 2: On the left and right, along the shorter sides of the rectangle, cut a strip around 2 cm wide from the lower edge up to around 2 cm below the upper edge. Be careful not to cut all the way through!

Step 3: Cut small slits on both ends, around 2 cm inwards from the hanging strips. The slits should be cut around 2 cm above the lower edge (for your ears).

Step 4 (optional): You can slide a piece of wire into the T-shirt seam, so you can adapt the mask to the shape of your nose and cheeks.

And your mask is already finished! Pull the slits over your ears and tie the loose fabric strips together behind the back of your head. If you want, you can also insert a piece of paper towel or coffee filter in the mask.

This easy recipe lets you make 18 cake pops. Try it with your parents!



Ingredients:

- 300g light or dark cake base (ready-made product or make it yourself)
- 60 g soft butter
- 70 g powdered sugar
- 40 g double cream cheese
- 150 g chocolate glaze (any brand)
- 18 wooden skewers at least 15 cm long
- decoration, such as sugar pearls

Preparation:

1. Crumble the cake base into fine crumbs. To make the cream cheese mixture, use a hand mixer to stir the butter, powdered sugar, and cream cheese thoroughly for about 3 minutes. Use a spoon to add the cream cheese mixture to the cake crumbs incrementally, stirring regularly until the mixture is easy to shape. But make sure it isn't too moist - it shouldn't stick to your hands when you're shaping it.
2. Divide the mixture into 18 portions, which you roll into small balls. Chill the cake balls for approx. 30 min. While the cake balls are being chilled, chop up the chocolate glaze and melt it over a warm water bath. Dip each wooden skewer around 1 cm deep into the cake glaze and then stick it into a cake ball. Place all the cake pops onto a plate and chill them for another 15 minutes.
3. Warm up the cake glaze again, if necessary. Dip each cake pop into the chocolate glaze at an angle and rotate it until it is completely covered. Tap the skewer against the side of the bowl to get rid of excess drops. Rotate the cake pop while doing so, to avoid nib formation. Decorate with sugar pearls, sprinkles, or other coatings however you like. Repeat the process for each cake pop.
